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Your kind donations have funded transformative change in the performance and well being of our athletes. Thanks to you, more than 7 years on from the opening of the Ely Boathouse, our athletes have had incredible success on the water. Since 2017, we have defeated Oxford in 30 out of 38 races, culminating in 2023's clean sweep. We hope you take incredible pride in what you have enabled. Thank you again.

The Boathouse was built to fulfil the training needs of the men and women of Cambridge University Boat Club, so that we can all boat from the same base, appropriate to a high-performance programme. The £4.9 million boathouse was opened in December 2016.

Rowing at Ely consistently provides good water over an almost limitless distance. The boathouse features a wet dock, four bays, rooms to rest, stretch and eat between sessions and a landing stage for three eights.

It is a place for hard athletic work, and as we walk in each day we are reminded of our purpose. Above the door is a sign that says this is "Where We Prepare To Win Boat Races".

CUBC's home on the Fens is an integral part of the Club's identity, much like Goldie represents our historic Cambridge HQ. It's remarkable to reflect on the facilities that our former students, now alumni, were training in at Ely prior to the Cambridge University Boat House opening in 2016.

Many of you will remember the basic, uninsulated shed in Ely, where the men tried to warm up before their outings. Others may vividly remember the tin lean-to with an outside toilet and a single cold-water tap next to the King's School Ely boathouse, where the women's boats were housed. Our lightweight men made do with whatever space they could find, often just boating off from the hard.

Back in 2010 a member of the men's CUBC committee, Chris Dalley, joined me in my capacity as Chair of CUWBC to discuss the idea of a joint fundraising effort for new shared facilities. We quickly brought in Bruce Perry of CULRC, kicking off a period of intense negotiations, debates, fundraising, and investments to modernise Cambridge University rowing.

The significance of those initial meetings cannot be overstated, as they marked the beginning of several projects including the Goldie extension (a strategic priority for the women's club as a Cambridge base), the Ely boathouse, the relocation of the women's and lightweight races to the Tideway, and ultimately the unification of the three clubs as CUBC.

The individuals and institutions involved throughout this period are too numerous to mention, but it is fair to say that we could not have achieved what we did without any one of them. Many are recognised in this inspiring report that looks back over the past seven years and celebrates the impact of the boathouse itself. I want to pay special tribute to those who believed in the transformative potential of a shared facility and generously contributed, with their names now recorded on the building as a way of eternal thanks. I also extend my gratitude to the three legacy club committees at the time who decided to move forward together, as well as the many others mentioned in the report who dedicated their time and energy to make daily decisions regarding planning, design, and construction. The project would not have been possible without the support of the University of Cambridge, Vice Chancellors Professor Sir Leszek Borysiewicz and Professor Stephen Toope, Pro-Vice Chancellor Graham Virgo, and our Senior Members. Sir Richard Dearlove chaired the initial working group, and Mike Sweeney steered us through some challenging late-night discussions about what was essential and what could be spared, along with Sarah Winckless and, of course, Roger Stephens, who led the fundraising effort with the true spirit of "what would make the boat go faster."

Reading the various testimonials in this report has been both emotional and uplifting. While there is no doubt that we can do more to enhance and refine the original concept, for now it has exceeded our wildest expectations. I extend my heartfelt thanks to everyone who dedicated themselves to making it a reality and to all the students who have trained there alongside one another since 2016, proving that the investment was truly worthwhile!

It's no coincidence that when I was coaching the women's team at Cambridge, we won the Boat Race the first year we rowed out of the new boathouse, after several years of losing. It's hard to overstate how important the new boathouse was; being able to rest and recover well in the right environment is crucial for athletes, and student-athletes in particular. It's also a real draw for prospective students if they know we have top-tier facilities.

Ely Boathouse has been transformational to the CUBC. For me space is the key component, to be able to have quiet chats with individuals at key points, sometimes positive selection talks, sometimes harder selections talks need spaces to be able to do this sensitively, the new facility has these spaces in abundance. Inspiration

Back in 1978 when I was in training for the Boat Race, one of our coaches used to stop us alongside Fore Mill Wash, on our way back to the marina after yet another hard outing, and the guys, cold, tired, and just wanting to get home, would grudgingly do as instructed to see the sun setting behind the magnificent Cathedral.

He was right. And what a fantastic location to build the new permanent home of the CUBC at Ely – a perfect setting for the finest boat club in the world.

When we visited the site, on that lovely sunny day, we were struck by how beautiful and desolate it was – long horizons and vast areas of nothingness, as only the Fens can serve up – with the odd clump of trees, factory chimney and the stunning Cathedral to break the skyline. And how wild and natural the river's edge was. We felt that whatever intervention was made here, it had to be respectful of the local natural habitat, leaving as much as possible undisturbed. We also felt strongly that any building had to work as a piece of sculpture in the landscape.

We came away with a strong image of a low building growing out of the Fens with a roof hovering over it conjuring the impression of birds flying low over the water or the protective wing of a large nesting bird on the reeded riverbank– something a bit intriguing and abstract in form and definitely more landscape than building when seen from a distance.

Design

The brief was to create a new iconic home for Cambridge University rowing on the banks of the Great Ouse outside Ely which was to be designed to last at least a hundred years. The new building was to provide boat storage for racing shells on the ground floor and crew and coaching facilities above for all the Cambridge crews who race against Oxford each year – bringing the clubs together for the first time.

Our scheme was selected primarily because of its unusual and distinctive roof – designed to produce an abstract profile in the landscape which changes as you move around it. It is formed by four gable-ended pitched roofs, tapered in plan with resultant sloping ridges, placed "top-to-tail" over the orthogonal plan below. The resultant "twist" in the roof reinforces the diagonal axis across the site towards the Cathedral.

The chosen site, a 12.5 acre long thin strip of riverside meadow about a mile outside Ely to the south east, was not without its complications, requiring a new road access up and over the fen bank, the flood barrier to the low lying fens to the south, a new river edge and boating pontoons, an inlet from the river for mooring the coaching launches, power, water and drainage (none of which were available on or near the site), and the creation of a large reeded lagoon at the far end of the site to provide enhanced habitat for local wildlife.



The Outcome

Looking back, it seems that one of the most important and successful aspects of the boathouse is not any one thing about the design but the very fact that it is there - an iconic new building to provide a new home for everyone all under one roof. For this we must be hugely grateful to those who donated to make it happen, as well as the vision and determination of the Project Ely Group and especially Ewan Pearson, Roger Stephens, Bruce Perry, Tom James, Paul Sansome, Cath Bishop and Mary Hood. Whilst I would, of course, like to think that it is the design of the building that makes the difference, in truth it is the fact that there is a building at all which does that. A place which enables everyone to come together in a common cause providing the best facilities to train effectively and together.

I am extremely proud that the boathouse has been so well received, and that it basks in the reflected glory of so many victories since completion. It also made a wonderful alternative venue to host the Boat Races during the difficult years of the pandemic - although I suspect Oxford wouldn't agree and won't want to return in a hurry!

Prioritising funding is never easy, but for me, the real game changer will be when we are able to complete the subsequent phases of the scheme. To have athletes' dormitories on site would enable the facility to be used for training camps out of term time, for entertaining visiting crews who may wish to come to Ely for some racing fixtures, and to hire out through the summer for training camps to help cover the costs of running the building. And who knows, maybe some aspiring young athletes on training camp at Ely (in the summer when they could be seduced into thinking it was a lovely place to train) might then decide to apply to the University to further their academic and rowing careers.

Bruce Perry was a lead fundraiser for the Ely Boathouse project, alongside Ewan Pearson and Roger Stephens, with treasurer Mary Hood also playing an integral role in the initiative. Here, Bruce recalls the early stages of the scheme:

"A select few had long held the view that rowing as one club was the way to create future excellence in Cambridge rowing and that being together was also the most equitable and overall most fun way to go. We had to begin that journey and given the poor facilities for most of the clubs, if not all of them, a boathouse seemed the most useful place to start. It would also galvanise the clubs by aligning to one objective even whilst operating separately.

Building a plan around alumni donations brought the clubs together and also (re)engaged alumni into something much bigger.

We were proved right. Whilst I cannot and would not claim that the record since coming together was down to any one person, I do believe donors played a pivotal role – through our enthusiasm and openness to change – and between the women's and men's clubs. I further felt these results have proved our position and our hard work well worth it and right!"

Putting all the historic organisations under one roof, literally and figuratively, was very important to me. I wanted to see the CUBC thriving for another 200 years, and we certainly have made a great start by winning 30 of the 38 races since we opened the doors at our permanent home in Ely."
